

Seven of Top Ten Grid Teams Play In Bowl Games

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Seven of the nation's top ten college football teams and 10 percent of the season's brightest individual stars feature the New Year's Day bowl schedule, a television viewer's bonanza.

The millions of armchair quarterbacks are in danger of suffering eye strain and getting finger cramps from watching the dials for the series of spec-

tacles, starting as early as 12:45 p.m. EST and lasting until well into most people's bedtime.

Here's the program expected to draw close to half a million live customers and enterprising countless others on the magic screen.

Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla.—Louisiana State, No. 3 ranked nationally, vs. Colorado, No. 6. 12:45 p.m. EST. ABC-TV, radio.

Sugar Bowl at New Orleans

—Alabama, No. 1 nationally, vs. Arkansas, No. 5. 1:45 p.m. EST. NBC-TV, color, radio.

Cotton Bowl at Dallas, Texas—No. 4 nationally, vs. Mississippi, No. 5. 2:12 p.m. EST. CBS-TV, radio.

Rose Bowl at Pasadena, Calif.—Minnesota, No. 7, vs. UCLA, unranked. 4:45 p.m. EST. NBC-TV, color, radio.

Sidewatched around this sports govt's delight are today's National Football League

championship between the New York Giants and Green Bay Packers at Green Bay, to be televised at 1:45 p.m., and the Senior Bowl Game Jan. 6, involving all-star players from the North and South, to be screened at 3 p.m.

On the record, the closest game should be that in the Cotton Bowl between Mississippi and Texas, two powerful, hardhitting eleven which finished the season with identical

9-1 records. Mississippi lost only to Louisiana State while Texas was a late upset victim of Texas Christian.

Mississippi, a team of tremendous speed and depth which led the nation in total offense, is rated a 5-point favorite over a lighter but quick Texas contingent, featuring an explosive all-America halfback named Jimmy Skilton. Texas has the top rushing record in the country but lacks

the versatility of Mississippi's striking power.

The game is a 75,000 sellout. In the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, where 100,000 spectators form the day's largest crowd, ponderous but rugged Minnesota rules an 8-point choice to beat UCLA and thus avenge a 17-0 loss to Washington last year.

The Gophers, who won seven of their nine games while wading through a tough Big Ten

schedule, feature straightaway power and ball control with All-America Sandy Stephens, a 215-pounder, the central figure in the operation.

UCLA (7-3) won six of its last seven games in capturing the Pacific Coast's Big Five championship. Coached by Billy Barnes, who like Minnesota's Coach Murray Warmath is a Tennessee graduate, the Utes use the single wing formation with Bob Smith and

Mike Haffner handling triple duties.

Alabama, which marched over ten opponents to the national championship, is rated a 12½ point pick over Arkansas in the Sugar Bowl, coaxed for a capacity crowd of 81,565.

The Razorbacks, who lost only to Mississippi and Texas in ten games, are a sinewy, scrappy outfit with two of the country's most effective running backs in Lance Alworth and Billy Joe Woody.
